














World map by Pieter van den Keere (1611)








Mercator world map (1569)




Catawba map on deerskin (1722)




Plan of Rome, Gaimbattista Nolli (1748)








Moche vessel depicting landscape (ca. 500)




Map of Inclesmoor, Yorkshire




Detail from Barbari's view of Venice (1500)





Map of Huron, Illinois, by Abraham Lincoln (1836)








Map of Virginia (detail), John Smith (1612)




Carte marines (detail), New Orleans (1724)




Plat of survey, Thomas Jefferson (ca. 1770)








Sir Francis Drake's silver medal (1581)










**Whale distribution chart, Matthew F. Maury



Feb 2, 3.

Distances. Helm's Dike to Road-fork at mouth of Deeping Coomb : 5 miles.
Road-fork to Ford of Tsen : 15 miles.
Ford of Tsen to Gates of Isengard : 30 miles.

[Isengard lies 18 miles upstream of Helmsdike western arm of
Valley of New Gurney]

King : lies 50 miles from Dike to Isengard Gate.

In this period and latitude Sunsets about 4:30 p.m. Feb 2.
Sunrise ... 8 a.m. Feb 3.

King leaves in late afternoon at about 3:30 p.m.
Passes down Coomb, through Wood, and reaches Road-fork at 5:00
- 1 gathering [Crows are seen far off].

They cover the 15 miles to Ford in just over 4 hours gentle walk
riding (walking New horses). Reach Ford 9:15 p.m.
See moon and stars off water. Walk on far side until 10 p.m.

They now ride on $\frac{3}{2}$ more hours until 1 a.m. Feb 3., covering
the ground & grass and lay on the grass under moon and
cover 14 miles by mid-night. Then lay back for night
just west of New Gurney.

Some sleep (but little) and very little time after mid-night
they are up in small hours.

Leave 8 a.m. They ride again, but cannot go fast
as the ground has steep ~~hillsides~~ ^{downward} and the horse
has to be led high-way.

At 5:15 ~~at 5:17~~ they meet Breyland (royal servant of
Entengaroth).

They reach Isengard gates (16 miles from morning start)
at 12:30 (afternoon).


Topographical view of Minas Tirith,



Only child of Charles Bon and an octoroon mistress whose name is not recorded. Born, New Orleans, 1859. Married a full-blood negress, name unknown, 1879. Died, Sutpen's Hundred, 1884.

JIM BOND (BON).


Son of Charles Etienne de Saint Velery Bon. Born, Sutpen's Hundred, 1882. Disappeared from Sutpen's Hundred, 1910. Whereabouts unknown.

QUENTIN COMPSON.

Grandson of Thomas Sutpen's first Yoknapatawpha County friend. Born, Jefferson, 1891. Attended Harvard, 1909-1910. Died, Cambridge, Mass., 1910.

SHREVLIN McCANNON.








World map on Ptolemy's conic projection ca. 1490













Rand McNally 9 x 14 foot wall map of the US




*Classification map of Creek and Seminole nations



We believe that the public lands ought, as far as possible, to be kept as homesteads for actual settlers; that all unearned lands heretofore improvidently granted to railroad corporations by the action of the Republican party should be restored to the public domain; and that no more grants of land shall be made to corporations, or be allowed to fall into the ownership of alien absentees.
